The Chimes Interview: The Rev. Dr. David Fisher

David and Gloria Fisher joined Cranston Memorial Presbyterian Church earlier this year. This Summer, the Rev. Dr. David Fisher announced that he was retiring from preaching.

The CHIMES sat down with David for an interview:

What is God doing in your life these days?

God is teaching me how to be retired, how to age gracefully, and blessing me with vitality each new day.

You've been a preacher for many years, including these last several here at Cranston. What stands out?

I was fascinated with preaching and homiletics since boyhood. My own father was a good preacher. I was 26 when called to my first church. The Spirit of God was moving in that place. The congregation grew; the experience shaped me.

The effectiveness of preaching is measured over time: what preaching does over ten years is what matters. Fred Craddock said preaching is moving an idea: getting from here to there. Moving an idea and moving a congregation. From Craddock I learned inductive preaching: asking one question and engaging the listeners to become active participants, moving on a journey to a certain destination where they can make their own conclusions.



How has your education helped you in ministry?

My work was in New Testament Interpretation. My advisor, George Beasley-Murray was one of the three great influences in my ministry, along with my father and Fred Craddock. I stuck my toe in the pool of academia but got out after earning my PhD. The academic world taught me to think theologically. That helped me to preach, making theological thinking available to the congregation.

What signs of possibility at Cranston give you the most hope?

The arrival recently of younger families and children! The question for Cranston (and all churches) is where are we going and how do we get there? The Session must provide leadership which provides vitality in the congregation and inspires people as they are part of the church. The presence of children and their families in the church is a sign of hope.

Watch for news of what our children and youth are doing in the days and weeks ahead! You see us in church and as

we head off to Sunday School. We meet during the week as well!
