They are often not needed for tax purposes but will be provided to those who ask. **The CHIMES interview features the Rev. Becky Bosarge.** We are glad to welcome Becky to our pulpit and thank her for her responses to our questions:

Who is most responsible for your being active in the church at this time? My family belonged to a small, rural Methodist church. The people of this congregation were so much a part of our lives and we of theirs. I can tell you about the homemade egg noodles Suzi made for the church potlucks; how I learned to sing alto from Marilyn; about the young woman with Down Syndrome who wore the finish off a pew in the spot where she kept the rhythm of the hymns with her hand; about Richard who enthusiastically led a weekly hymn sing between Sunday school and wor-



ship. It wasn't a perfect place, of course, but God was real there in our singing, praying, laughing, and caring.

How have you grown in your faith?: I could tell you about the time in my early 20s when something so awful happened to someone I loved that it caused me to begin a 4-yr journey of letting go of some of the images of God I had been taught and learning to embrace some new ones. I could tell you about how, in the process of grieving the loss of my mother, I found my way to the mystics and contemplatives of our faith. But I will tell you about a moment in a seminar at Bellarmine University. I was with my cohort in the Master of Arts in Spirituality program, we were reading and discussing *Gilead* by Marilynne Robinson. This book describes so profoundly the beauty in our human lives, the sacred nature of our existence. At some point as we were discussing this idea and its implications for ministry and living, one of the professors gently and warmly looked at me and said, "Becky, that is your vocation." This moment still resonates as a moment of clarity and guidance for my experience of God, my ministry, and how I see myself as a friend of God and God's world.

What is God doing in your life?: These days, God is refreshing my spirit with time to enjoy grandkids, the woods in my backyard, and Lake Michigan; energizing me with time to be creative; surprising me continually with opportunities to be in spiritual community with others, to do the work I'm called to do; and God is growing my sense of peace with all of that. I haven't taken the most direct or maybe typical route to ministry (or life!) and that is a blessing and a challenge sometimes, but God is showing me the way, including through all of you at Cranston!
